# From the Principal

#### Child Safe Standards

Camelot Rise Primary School is committed to safety and wellbeing of all children and young people. This will be the primary focus of our care and decision-making. Camelot Rise Primary School has zero tolerance for child abuse.

Our school is committed to providing a child safe environment where children and young

people are safe and feel safe, and their voices are heard about decisions that affect their lives. Particular attention is paid to the cultural safety of children from culturally and/or linguistically diverse backgrounds, as well as the safety of children with a disability.



Every person involved in Camelot Rise Primary School has a responsibility to understand the important and specific role they play to

ensure that the safety and wellbeing of our students is at the forefront of every decision they make.

To create and maintain a child safe organisation, we maintain ongoing compliance with the Eleven Child Safe Standards. For registered schools, Ministerial Order No. 1359 sets out the specific actions to meet these requirements.

#### NAPLAN 2025

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 12 March 2025 and finishes on Monday 24 March 2025.

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. It has been part of the school calendar

since 2008. NAPLAN tests the sorts of skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life, such as reading, writing, spelling/grammar/punctuation and numeracy. The assessments are undertaken nationwide, every year, in mid-March (previously May).



NAPLAN is made up of tests in the four areas (or 'domains') of:

- reading
- writing
- language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation)
- numeracy.

At Camelot Rise Primary School, we take great pride and care in ensuring that our students are not overwhelmed by the suite of assessments that are comprised in the NAPLAN schedule. Whilst NAPLAN tests are an important system-level component of the Department of Education, at Camelot Rise Primary School they are viewed as just another form of assessment in our ongoing process of monitoring student achievement.

To alleviate any pressure or anxiety associated with the tests, a special timetable has been formulated to assist teachers and students in the implementation of the tests. The timetable provides ample time both before and after testing for students to prepare and relax. In addition, students will also have an opportunity to familiarise themselves with the types of questions, layout and expected timeframes within which they are required to work for each of the test domains.

We are confident that our well-considered preparatory procedures will enable your children to complete the NAPLAN assessment suite with minimal concern. For more information about NAPLAN please click on the link: <a href="https://www.nap.edu.au/">https://www.nap.edu.au/</a>

# Working With Children Checks (WWCC)

We encourage and value parental and community support at Camelot Rise Primary School.

There are many ways that parents, grandparents and friends can assist at our school. We encourage all parents to obtain a Working with Children's Check that will allow you to be very involved in your child's education.

These checks are free for volunteers and will allow you to be involved in as many school events as you would like. Once you have your



WWCC, please come to the office so we can photocopy this, and we will add your name to our list of parents who have a current WWCC check.

### Tutor Learning Initiative

The Victorian State Government has continued to fund the tutor learning initiative for 2025 to support learning catch up. The Tutor Learning Initiative (TLI) is worth \$200+ million across State Government Schools which is an unprecedented investment of a program of this nature. This funding is being used to employ teachers to work with students who fell behind in their learning.

Our Tutor Learning Teacher is Mrs Sarah Martin. Mrs Martin has been working with individual students and small groups of students since the start of the year. Mrs Martin works with the classroom teachers to plan and teach a program that reflects on the work being completed in the classroom and works on the individual learning needs of these students.

Mrs Martin has communicated with all families that have their child/children attending these Tutor Learning Sessions.

The focus areas for tutoring are Maths, Reading and Writing, and there are also many incidental benefits, such as the development of confidence, independence, building self-esteem and persistence.

# Parental Communication Policy

At Camelot Rise PS we are committed to effective communication and ensuring that appropriate opportunities exist for parents to raise any concerns and ask questions related to their child's education, wellbeing and progress.

Typically, parents will need to make an appointment to meet with their child's teacher, especially if the matter needs an in-depth discussion. A meeting such as this is best done at a mutually convenient time, where there is enough time to have a proper discussion. Please contact the office if you wish to make an appointment with one of our teaching staff. You can also contact the teacher via Compass or email.

Before school is usually not convenient to contact teachers as they are usually making final preparations for teaching. A brief message is usually Ok before school, so long as a long

discussion is not required. After school is the best time and our teachers will endeavour to fit this in around our regular meetings, which are held on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

#### **Mathletics**

This year all students at Camelot Rise PS will be registered to access Mathletics, which is an online Maths Program that the children can use both at school and at home. In the next few weeks all students will receive a password and login from their class teacher.




Playgroup is held in the Tydeman Arts Centre starting at 9.15am until 10.30am.

# Parking

Parking is available along King Arthur Drive, Galahad Crescent and Avalon Avenue. Monash City Council Parking Inspectors regularly monitor the parking situation in Galahad Crescent. As the safety of all our students is our prime concern, we are pleased that the Council has taken this initiative to ensure that the parking restrictions are observed. When vehicles are

stopped or parked too close to the crossing, the visibility of drivers approaching the school crossing is impaired and <u>this places our students at risk.</u> We ask parent's co-operation in keeping this area clear <u>at all times.</u>

Please remember that to maximise the safety of all our students (and community) it is important to observe and follow all guidelines in place at all times:


- There is a 2-minute drop-off zone in place, which means <u>2 minutes maximum</u>.
   Vehicles are not to be left unattended.
- There is a Permit Only Zone in front of the staff carpark. Please do not park here unless you have a permit.
- Abide by all road rules
- Use the crossings provided (manned or not) to cross the road
- Ensure children exit the car on the footpath side
- Encourage your children to stand on the footpath not on the road when leaving the car
- Be patient and respectful of other motorists

At Camelot Rise Primary School, we use the School-Wide Positive Behaviour Support (SWPBS) framework to create a safe, respectful, and engaging learning environment. A key part of this approach is our token reward system, which recognises and encourages positive behaviour.

Students earn tokens when demonstrating our school values like kindness, responsibility, resilience, respect, and teamwork. These tokens are exchanged for whole-school

rewards, reinforcing that positive actions are valued and appreciated. Importantly, students have a voice in selecting these rewards, making them more meaningful and exciting. This term, they have chosen Crazy Sock Day, Free Dress Day, or a Movie Afternoon.



Students are excited about the reward system, with one student sharing, "I love earning tokens because it reminds me to be kind and helpful. I can't wait for Crazy Sock Day!" Another student added, "It's fun to work together as a school to reach our whole school reward."

We encourage families to talk with their children about the tokens they earn and celebrate their efforts at home. Thank you for being so supportive in making our school a positive and inclusive place for all!

# Privacy Information



### Privacy Collection Notice for parents and carers

The Department of Education (the department) values your privacy and is committed to protecting the personal and health information that schools collect.

All school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law and the <u>Schools' Privacy Policy</u>. This notice explains how the department, including Victorian government schools (schools), handles personal and health information. On occasion, specific consent will be sought for the collection and use of information, for example, for a student to receive a health service. Our schools are also required by legislation, such as the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006*, to collect some of this information.

Throughout this notice, 'staff' includes principals, teachers, student support service officers, youth workers, social workers, nurses and any other allied health practitioners, and all other employees, contractors, volunteers and service providers of the school and the department.

On enrolment, and during the ordinary course of a student's attendance at a school, schools will collect information about students and their families for the following purposes:

- educating students
- · supporting students' social and emotional wellbeing, and health
- fulfilling legal obligations, including duty of care, anti-discrimination law and occupational health and safety law
- communicating and engaging with parents
- student administration
- school management
- supporting policy in relation to student education and wellbeing.

If this information is not collected, schools may be unable to provide optimal education or support to students or fulfil legal obligations.

For example, our schools rely on parents to provide **health information** about any medical condition or disability that their child has, medication their child may take while at school, any known allergies and contact details of their child's doctor. If parents do not provide all relevant health information, this may put their child's health at risk.

Our schools also require current, relevant information about all **parents and carers** so that schools can take account of safety concerns that affect their children. Parents should provide schools with copies of all current parenting plans and court orders about or that affect their children and provide updated copies when they change.

When parents enrol their child in primary school, they will be asked to provide personal and health information in several ways, including via the Enrolment Form, the <u>School Entrance Health Questionnaire</u> (SEHQ) and the <u>Early Childhood Intervention Service</u> (ECIS) Transition Form.

The **Enrolment Form** is used to collect information that is essential for the purposes listed above, and requests information such as:

- Emergency contacts Individuals parents nominate for a school to contact during
  an emergency. Parents should ensure that their nominated emergency contact
  agrees to their contact details being provided to the school and that they understand
  their details may be disclosed by the department if lawful, e.g. in the case of
  emergency communications relating to bush fires or floods.
- Student background information Information about country of birth, Aboriginal or
  Torres Strait Islander origin, language spoken at home and parent occupation. This
  information enables the department to allocate appropriate resources to schools.
  The department also uses this information to plan for future educational needs in
  Victoria and shares some information with the Commonwealth government to
  monitor, plan and allocate resources.
- Immunisation status This assists schools to manage health risks and legal obligations. The department may also provide this information to the Department of Health and Department of Families, Fairness and Housing to assess immunisation rates in Victoria, but not in a way which identifies students.
- **Visa status** This is required to process a student's enrolment.

All schools may use departmental systems and online tools such as apps and other software to effectively collect and manage information about students and families for the purposes listed above.

When schools use these online tools, they take steps to ensure that student information is secure. If parents or carers have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact the school.

School staff will only share student and family information with other school staff who need to know to enable them to educate or support the student as described above. Information will only be shared outside the school (and outside the department) as required or authorised by law, including where sharing is required to meet duty of care, anti-discrimination, occupational health and safety, and child wellbeing and safety obligations. The information collected will not be disclosed beyond the school and department without parent consent unless such disclosure is lawful.

When a student transfers to another school (including Catholic, independent and interstate), personal and/or health information about that student may be transferred to the next school. Transferring this information is in the best interests of the student and assists the next school to provide the best possible education and support to the student. For further detail about how and what level of information is provided to the next school, refer to the: Enrolment: Student transfers between schools

Schools only provide school reports and ordinary school communications to students, parents, carers or others who have a legal right to that information. Requests for access to other student information or by others must be made by lodging a <u>Freedom of Information</u> (FOI) application.

To update student or family information, parents should contact their school.
