Assistant Principal Report

Staying Warm!

According to the Bureau of Meteorology, the forecast for the next week, and possibly beyond, is for continued cold and blustery weather. Given that is the case, it is important that all students wear suitable items of uniform such as their bomber jackets, windcheaters and hoodies, to enable them keep adequately warm between now and the end of the Term. In addition to the wearing of those aforementioned uniform items, singlets and other discreet undergarments can provide further means to stave off the cold. We have



had several students approach teachers and the General Office complaining that they are feeling cold, therefore your cooperation in ensuring that your children are coming to school with clothing that will keep them adequately warm, would be greatly appreciated.



Late arrivals

Over the last week or two, it has become noticeable that a number of families are dropping students off to school either after the music begins at 8:57am, or after the 9:00am bell. In order for students to be able to start their day in an orderly manner, it is vitally important that all students who are present for the day are in their classroom, organised and ready to learn by the time the 9:00am bell sounds. As a parent or guardian, if you knowingly arrive after the 9:00am bell, you have a duty of care to follow the agreed protocol of

accompanying your children to the General Office first to be signed in, before then accompanying them to their classroom. Parents who do not follow the agreed protocol and just drop their children off at the curb after 9:00am, put their children at potential risks as they are effectively unsupervised once you drive away. In any case, students who arrive to classrooms without having been signed in at the General Office, will be asked to return to the General Office, sign in, and then return to class, causing further and unnecessary delays to the morning's learning.

Victorian Curriculum - Intercultural Capability

The Intercultural Capability consists of two strands:

Strands	Cultural Practices	Cultural Diversity
	This strand involves students in describing, observing and analysing characteristics of their own cultural identities and those of others. They compare their own knowledge and experiences with those of others, learning to recognise commonalities, acknowledging differences between their lives and seek to understand and engage in critical reflection about such differences. The ability to reflect on the meaning of intercultural experiences is an essential element in intercultural learning. Students use critical reflection to better understand the perspectives and actions of individuals and groups in specific situations and how these can be shaped by culture.	This strand involves students understanding the nature of cultural diversity. Students critically examine the concept of respect, challenges and opportunities created by cultural diversity and the way in which cultural diversity shapes and contributes to social cohesion.

The Intercultural capability curriculum focuses on learning about cultural understandings and practices. Students examine, reflect on and challenge assumptions, stereotypes and prejudices and explore how intercultural experiences can influence and change attitudes and beliefs.

Students apply their learning in intercultural capability to complex questions of the globalised world. Intercultural capability fosters skills that assist students to negotiate across barriers that may arise from differences.

Intercultural capability is strongly connected to those areas of learning concerned with people and their societies, relationships and interactions, including the Personal and Social capability knowledge and skills related to empathy, openness, respect and conflict resolution.

Rationale

Intercultural interactions have become a part of everyday life in our increasingly multicultural and globalised world. Developing intercultural knowledge, skills and understandings is an essential part of living with others in the diverse world of the twenty-first century. The Intercultural capability curriculum assists young people to become responsible local and global citizens, equipped for living and working together in an interconnected world.

Intercultural capability enables students to learn to value their own cultures, languages and beliefs, and those of others. Students learn about diverse cultures in ways that recognise commonalities and differences, create connections with others and cultivate mutual respect.

The Melbourne Declaration on Educational Goals for Young Australians recognises the fundamental role that education plays in building a society that is 'cohesive and culturally diverse, and that values Australia's Indigenous cultures'. The Intercultural capability curriculum addresses this role, developing students who are active and informed citizens with an appreciation of Australia's social, cultural, linguistic and religious diversity, and the ability to relate to and communicate across cultures at local, regional and global levels.

Aims

Intercultural capability aims to develop knowledge, understandings and skills to enable students to:

- demonstrate an awareness of and respect for cultural diversity within the community
- reflect on how intercultural experiences influence attitudes, values and beliefs
- recognise the importance of acceptance and appreciation of cultural diversity for a cohesive community.



CRPS old uniform recycling drive

Each year tonnes of clothes and textiles end up in landfills, but as much as 95% could be used again. 6BM have decided to run a clothing donation drive for all the old Camelot Rise School uniforms what will not be worn again in 2018 when new uniform changes take effect.





With some research we have discovered that the clothing company H&M has a garment collecting initiative which has been created to decrease clothing waste.




6BM along with the Uniform Shop are running clothing drive where you can donate your old school uniforms and any other unwanted clothes. They will then be taken to a H&M store to be donated for recycling.

You will be able to donate your old school uniforms along with any other unwanted clothes and they will be taken to an H&M store to be donated for recycling.

Once the old garments have been dropped off in a store, the company I:CO collects and sorts them into three categories:

- Rewear clothing that can be worn again will be sold as second hand clothes.
- Reuse old clothes and textiles will be turned into other products, such as cleaning cloths.
- Recycle everything else is turned into textile fibres, and used for things like insulation.



We will be running this drive from Week 8 of Term 3 until Week 8 of Term 4. Marked boxes for collections will be located in the Library, Uniform Shop, Unit B, Unit D, 6BM & 4Hs classroom.

Every donation made will receive a raffle ticked to win a 15% off voucher to H&M. There will be a number of vouchers to be won. This will be drawn at the end of Term 4.

Ask for your Child Care Rebate to be paid 'directly' to OSHClub on your behalf as a fee reduction.


