Assistant Principal Report

<u>Victorian Curriculum – Personal & Social Capabilities</u>

In Australia and amongst other developed countries, contemporary school curriculum has evolved and broadened to include not only a focus on traditional subject content, but also the inclusion of aspects of learning, including higher order thinking, ethics, diversity and intercultural understandings and social and emotional learning.

In our own state school system, the recently introduced *Victorian Curriculum* sets out what every student should learn during their first eleven years of schooling. In doing so, it offers a curriculum that presents as being significantly different (as well as being experienced significantly differently by students and teachers) to the curriculum that was implemented 10 or even 5 years ago, let alone the school system we engaged in during the 70's, 80's and 90's. These changes reflect the learning needs of students, in our ever changing world.

A significant part of the *Victorian Curriculum* is the establishment of the *Capabilities*. These *Capabilities*, which are a set of discrete knowledge and skills that can and should be taught explicitly in and through the Learning Areas (subjects). The four capabilities in the Victorian Curriculum are:

- Critical and Creative Thinking
- Ethical
- Intercultural
- Personal and Social

The remainder of this will be focus on the *Personal and Social Capability*, which is organised into two strands: *Self-Awareness and Management* and *Social Awareness and Management*. The intent with the Personal and Social Capability curriculum, is for students to focus on understanding their identity, express their emotions and navigate different types of relationships, including working collaboratively with other students.

Personal relationships, including an understanding of the importance of establishing and maintaining respectful relationship, supports students and helps prepare them to face challenges with resilience and confidence.

Rationale

The Personal and Social Capability is essential in enabling students to understand themselves and others, and manage their relationships, lives, work and learning more effectively. The capability involves students learning to recognise and regulate emotions, develop empathy for others and understand relationships, establish and build a framework for positive relationships, work effectively in teams and develop leadership skills, and handle challenging situations constructively.

The Personal and Social Capability supports students in becoming creative and confident individuals with a sense of self-worth, self-awareness and personal identity that enables them to manage their emotional, mental, spiritual and physical wellbeing, with a sense of hope and optimism about their lives and the future. On a social level, it helps students to form and maintain healthy relationships and prepares them for their potential life roles as family, community and workforce members.

Aims

The Personal and Social Capability curriculum aims to develop knowledge, understandings and skills to enable students to:


- recognise, understand and evaluate the expression of emotions
- demonstrate an awareness of their personal qualities and the factors that contribute to resilience
- develop empathy for and understanding of others and recognise the importance of supporting diversity for a cohesive community
- understand how relationships are developed and use interpersonal skills to establish and maintain respectful relationships
- work effectively in teams and develop strategies to manage challenging situations constructively



Windows into other worlds:


Create a window into your favourite fiction land or realm:


